Meeting Highlights

Innovation, Shark Tank, Diversity, Mottek on Money and More!

Dr. Amy Paller, Chair of the 2021 Program Committee, has an exciting curriculum planned for this year's meeting in Amelia Island, Florida.

ADA Shark Tank

The theme is innovation and our Friday guests are scientists and innovators. Dr. Sylvia Daunert will headline the morning, sharing with us her use of nanotechnology for developing molecular diagnostic tools and drug delivery platforms for cancer treatment. We'll also hear an update on innovation in dermatology from ADA member Rox Anderson (dermatology's innovator extraordinaire). Together with Drs. Daunert and Anderson, Mayo Clinic's Chief Innovation Officer, Charles Bruce, MD, and ADA members Fred Beddingfield (industry leader) and Markham Luke (FDA) will form a panel of "Sharks" for an hour of challenges and fun in the *ADA Shark Tank*. ADA members will be dared to submit innovative "products" that demonstrate creative solutions to dermatologic problems. Three products will be presented to the "Sharks" while fellow ADA-ers in the audience witness a thought-provoking interchange....and have some fun!

Increasing Diversity

A dilemma that looms large is the limited diversity in our specialty. The dermatology workforce does not resemble the US population for whom we provide care. Thursday will be devoted to collectively understanding the implications of our lack of underrepresented minorities in dermatology and brainstorming creative solutions. Diana Lautenberger from the AAMC will headline the session, discussing implicit bias after collating data from a pre-meeting assignment for all attendees. Other ADA panel members will discuss microaggressions, social and cultural capital, a holistic approach to residency selection, economic barriers, the paucity of mentorship programs, and issues related to the pipeline of underrepresented minorities.

Mottek on Money

We have seen that unprecedented events, ranging from environmental disasters to virulent infections, can destabilize society and damage our economy. We are delighted to have Frank Mottek, the voice of business and economic news ("Mottek on Money"), as our Saturday guest speaker. He will comment on his experiences with events that have impacted our economy and his predictions for the future.

Young Leadership

As is tradition, the ADA Saturday program will also highlight the innovative research of rising stars in dermatology. This year's Young Leadership recipient, Dr. Michael Rosenblum, studies the regulation of immune mechanisms in the skin, with the goal of translating this knowledge to therapy. Two

Resident/Fellow Awardees will also present their work.

Initiatives and Leadership

Based on feedback from membership, practical tips in medical and pediatric dermatology will be presented. Leaders of ADA Strategic Initiatives will update us on the role of pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) and impact of their immunosuppression on skin cancers in transplant patients. We'll get a glimpse into the new ICD-11 Classification, discuss "hot button" items from the RUC team and get some financial tips. A leader of the AAD Leadership Institute will provide an overview and review opportunities for ADA members. We again invite dermatology journal editors to the stage, to engage members in a panel discussion about the future of dermatology journals printed on paper. Finally, the session will round out on Sunday morning with a rapid-fire discussion about pressing issues by dermatology leaders.

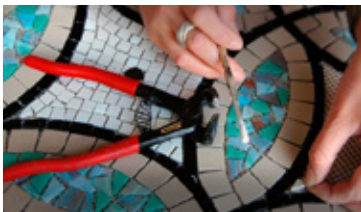

Dr. Charles James Bruce, MBChB, FCP (SA), FACC, FASE



Dr. Charles Bruce serves as Chief Innovation Officer for Mayo Clinic Florida. He is also the Medical Director of the Innovation Exchange, as well as Assistant Medical Director for Mayo Clinic Department of Business Development, and Director for Business Development in the Center for Regenerative Medicine at Mayo Clinic in Florida. Dr. Bruce is a practicing cardiologist as well as a researcher, inventor, and professor of Medicine. His unique perspective into the challenges of health care delivery are shaped by his medical experiences in South Africa and the United States. Dr. Bruce is an accomplished innovator who helped create seven start-up companies. He holds more than 50 patents for medical inventions.

Sylvia Daunert, PharmD, MS, PhD



Sylvia Daunert, PharmD, MS, PhD, Excma. Dra. is the Lucille P. Markey Chair of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at the Miller School of Medicine and the Director of the JT Macdonald Foundation Biomedical Nanotechnology Institute of the University of Miami. Prior to joining the University of Miami, Dr. Daunert was the Gill Eminent Professor of Chemistry and Professor of Pharmaceutical Sciences at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Daunert was also a Distinguished Professor of the College of Arts & Sciences and a University of Kentucky Research Professor. Among others, she is a Fulbright Scholar, an ELAM Fellow, and the recipient of the American Association for Clinical Chemistry Van Slyke Research Award, the National Science Foundation-CAREER Award, the Cottrell-

Scholars Award, the Lilly Analytical Faculty Award, the American Chemical Society A. F. Findeis Award, the National Science Foundation Special Creativity Award, the Bill Barfield Award from the Kentucky Water Resources Research Institute, the Albert D. and Elizabeth H. Kirwan Memorial Prize, the Provost's Award for Scholarly Achievements of the University of Miami, the 2015 WCA Cancer Researcher of the Year Award, the 2018 Florida Cancer Initiative “Sunshine Award” from the South Florida Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Daunert's research focuses on the development of bio-inspired nanotechnologies to solve biomedical and environmental problems. Her group genetically engineers living cells and proteins for environmental detection, molecular sensing, molecular diagnostics, point-of-care tests, biomarker identification, and drug delivery. Additionally, the research of the group focuses on the development of targeted and responsive drug delivery systems. Dr. Daunert's work has been featured in over 250 publications, has resulted in patents, and has been highlighted by the scientific media and popular press. She serves as editor and is a member of editorial and scientific advisory boards of journals, professional societies, as well as governmental and industrial organizations. Among other international awards and honors, Dr. Daunert is a member of the Real Academia Nacional de Farmacia of Spain and Academic D'Honor of the Reial Acadèmia de Farmàcia de Catalunya. In 2015, Dr. Daunert received the title of Ilustrísima Doctora and in 2016 the title of Excelentísima Doctora from the Kingdom of Spain. Finally, in 2018 Dr. Daunert was awarded a Professorship at the Institute of Hematology and Blood Diseases of the Chinese Academy of Medical Sciences and the Peking Union Medical College.

She has also led leadership and workforce engagement initiatives aimed at faculty development for the AAMC. Ms. Lautenberger is part of the AAMC's integrated team dedicated to unconscious bias training and education. She is a certified trainer with CookRoss®, a diversity and inclusion consulting firm, and provides in-depth implicit bias, microaggressions, allyship, and

bystander intervention training to faculty, staff, and allied health professionals. In addition, she is part of several efforts at the AAMC to integrate training into recruitment, advancement, and operational systems at academic health centers.

"Immune Regulation in Skin"

Michael D. Rosenblum, MD, PhD

Professor of Dermatology, UCSF Dept of Dermatology



Dr. Rosenblum's research exploits improvements in the understanding of the regulation of immune responses to treat human disease. Using transgenic mouse model systems, Dr. Rosenblum discovered that regulatory T cells (Tregs) differentiate into memory cells that utilize unique pathways for their establishment and long-term maintenance. These cells play a major role in wound healing, epidermal barrier repair, and mediating tolerance to commensal microbes. He also discovered that skin-resident Tregs augment the function of epithelial stem cells in hair follicle regeneration. A unique population of tissue-resident Tregs was recently found to be dysfunctional in patients with psoriasis, scleroderma, and melanoma. Dr. Rosenblum recently

helped to generate and validate a novel therapeutic molecule that selectively activates human Tregs for the treatment of patients with autoimmune diseases.

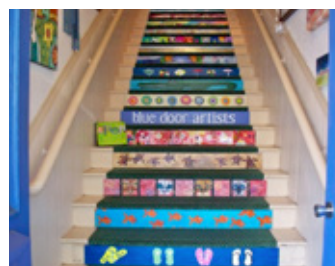
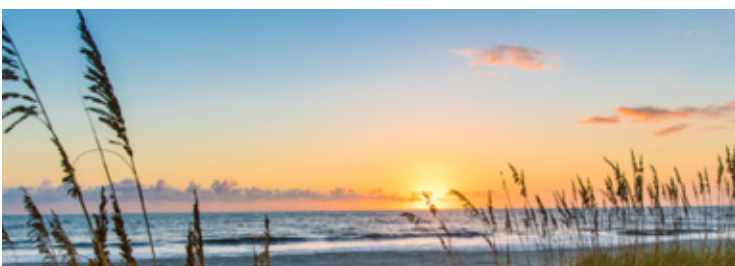
