ADA 2023 – HEALTHCARE ADVANCES AND CHALLENGES

We are headed to Washington, D.C. – founded on July 16, 1790, as a completely planned national capital, independent of the states, situated on a site specifically picked by President George Washington along the picturesque Potomac and Anacostia rivers.

In such an historic and amazing city, on the precipice of a Presidential election, how do we organize a meeting that is worthy of the time and the setting? We propose that it is by acknowledging some of the incredible innovations made in healthcare that are relevant to our specialty and to our patients, while simultaneously taking a hard look at the challenges we continue to face in health care delivery and economics. In conjunction with this, we thought it fitting to instigate a dialogue around the role of media in communicating science and technology – a responsibility that inexorably affects how our patients perceive discoveries that lead to healthcare advances and understand the challenges and inequities that we, as physicians, experience as we strive to deliver the highest quality of care. With that in mind, here is what is in the queue, taking the utmost advantage of some of the local D.C. talent...

We kick off our meeting on Thursday with our tradition of hearing updates from select national organizations. Dr. Markham Luke, Director of Therapeutic Performance at the FDA, will speak to the intersection of the FDA with Dermatology. As the Director of National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases, Dr. Lindsey Criswell will update us on the NIH and Skin Research; Dr. Jack Resneck, Immediate Past-President of the AMA, will inform us of the current advances made and the challenges faced by the AMA. Next, we will hear from Dr. Niroshana Anandasabapathy, dermatologist and physician scientist, on recent advances in melanoma therapeutics that have positively impacted the overall survival of our patients with advanced disease. Our aesthetic session will follow, and in keeping with our theme of advances and challenges, we will begin with the history of cosmetic dermatology and laser surgery, delivered by Drs. Hal Brody and Tina Alster, respectively, and transition into a contemporary panel discussion with a line-up of esteemed experts. Dermatology resident awardee presentations moderated by Dr. Valerie Callender will wrap up the session.

On Friday, we will turn our attention to challenges in healthcare. Drs. Alexa Kimball and Melinda Buntin will speak to managing large health care systems in their respective roles as CEO of BIDMC Harvard Medical Faculty Physicians and Director of the Center for Health Systems and Policy Modeling at Hopkins. RDML Richardae Araujo, Associate Commissioner for Minority Health Director at the FDA, will then discuss health care inequities and how we, as physicians, can help to address the disparities. This will lead to a discussion on the role of the news media in today's fast-paced environment, a topic that will be tackled (adroitly, I am sure) by Judy Woodruff, Senior Correspondent, Former Anchor and Managing Editor of PBS Newshour. Peer-peer introductions by our new members will conclude the session, and they undoubtedly will be "challenged" to keeping their intros to four minutes. We know Dan will have them precisely timed!

Saturday sessions bring us back to healthcare advances. Dr. Doug Lowy, Principal Deputy Director of the NCI, will lead off the session with a discussion of the current and future impact of the HPV vaccine. I have no doubt he will also integrate the important aspect of healthcare inequity in the context of this advance. Next up, Dr. David Y. Chen, dermatologist, physician-scientist, and the ADA Young Leadership Award recipient, addresses the evolving role of intralesional therapies in melanoma and cutaneous oncology in dermatology. This will be followed by Dr. Amy Paller, who tackles the topic of AI, not only in cutaneous oncology, but also in other dermatologic applications.

Our late morning Saturday session is emblematic of both healthcare advances and challenges. How many of us have struggled to interpret pathology reports of pigmented lesions that are descriptive in nature and incorporate new stains or technologies as we make treatment decisions? We have assembled a panel of experts to help address these challenges using a case-based format: Dr. Pedram Gerami, Director of the Skin Cancer Institute at Northwestern; Dr. Phil Leboit, Chief of Dermatopathology at UCSF; and Dr. Kelly Cordoro, Chief of Pediatric Dermatology at USCF. We look forward to an interesting and informative discussion. It is with great pleasure that we will then end our session with the awarding of the ADA Lifetime Achievement Award to Dr. Elizabeth McBurney – a visionary and highly principled physician, a trailblazer, and a true legend in our field.

On to Sunday – you must stay! Back by popular demand – Editor's Picks. The Editors of our most elite journals will provide highlights of papers published over the previous year that they deem as high impact to Dermatology. And finally, new to the ADA line-up, we will spotlight our D.C. programs and their collaborative endeavors. I look forward to learning from this group and incorporating some of the initiatives that they present.

In closing, it has been a true privilege to work with the ADA Leadership, Julie Odessky, and the entire Program Committee on the development of the 2023 ADA meeting that we proudly present to you, our members. We hope that you find our program both educational and exciting. We look forward to seeing you in October in Washington, D.C.

Lindsey A. Criswell, M.D., M.P.H., D.Sc., became Director of NIAMS in February 2021. Previously, she served as vice chancellor of research at the University of California, San Francisco, as well as professor of rheumatology and professor of orofacial sciences. Her research focuses on the genetics and epidemiology of human autoimmune disease, particularly rheumatoid arthritis and systemic lupus erythematosus. She also has mentored many students and junior faculty to independent research careers. Dr. Criswell earned a Bachelor's degree in genetics and a Master's degree in public health from the University of California, Berkeley; a D.Sc. in genetic epidemiology from the Netherlands Institute for Health Sciences, Rotterdam; and an M.D. from UCSF. Dr. Criswell is board certified in internal medicine and rheumatology.



Niroshana Anandasabapathy, MD, PhD is Associate Professor of Dermatology in the Department of Dermatology at Weill Cornell Medical College, is Vice-Chair of Research in Dermatology, and is actively involved in Immuno-oncology at the Meyer Cancer Center. As a practicing physician-scientist with a focus on melanoma, Dr. Anandasabapathy's translational and basic science laboratory studies immune barrier homeostasis and the influence on tumor immune surveillance in both mice and humans. Her lab seeks to understand how tissue immune homeostasis is conditioned, maintained, and co-opted by tumors, leading to tumor immune escape. Her group studies DC: T cell cross-talk in barrier sites and in tumors. They also study the role of DC in protein vaccine immunity, smallpox immunization, and TRM regulation; they also seek to understand how the hierarchy of DC programs in tissues contributes to their behavior.

Dr. Anandasabapathy received formal training in cancer biology and T cell immunology during both her MD PhD studies at Stanford University and her Dermatology residency at NYU. She received a Master's in clinical investigation while conducting clinical trials and studying DC biology at the Rockefeller University with the late Ralph Steinman (Nobel Prize 2011). She then started her own lab at Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School in 2013. She relocated her lab to Weill Cornell Medicine in NYC in 2018, where she currently has active roles in Dermatology, the Meyer Cancer Center, and precision human immunology.

Melinda Buntin joined Vanderbilt School of Medicine in 2013 as professor and founding chair of the Department of Health Policy. In March 2018, she was appointed the Mike Curb Chair for Health Policy and, in January 2022, was appointed the University Distinguished Professor of Health Policy and University Distinguished Professor of Medicine, Health, and Society.

Before coming to Vanderbilt, Dr. Buntin was a Director in the Health, Retirement and Long-Term Analysis Division of the Congressional Budget Office where she evaluated legislative proposals and directed studies related to health care financing, including reports on prescription drugs under Part D, beneficiaries dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, and care coordination demonstrations. She also served as chief economist and founding director of the Office of Economics, Evaluation, and Modeling within the Office of the National Coordinator for Health IT. Prior to that, Dr. Buntin was deputy director of RAND Health's Economics, Financing, and Organization Program, director of Public Sector Initiatives for RAND Health, and co-director of the Bing Center for Health Economics. Her research at RAND focused on insurance benefit design, health insurance markets, provider payment, and the needs of the elderly.

Dr. Buntin's work at Vanderbilt is focused on health care delivery and costs, with an emphasis on improving the value created by the health care system. She is an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine and of the National Academy of Social Insurance. She is the deputy editor of a new peer-reviewed health policy journal, *JAMA Health Forum*, and she serves on the Board of the Harvard Medical Faculty Practice.

Dr. Buntin has an A.B. from Princeton University and a Ph.D. in Health Policy with a concentration in economics from Harvard.

Effective July 2023, Dr. Buntin will be Bloomberg Distinguished Professor of Health Policy and Economics and Founding Director of the Center for Health Systems and Policy Modeling at Johns Hopkins University.

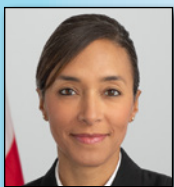

FDA Office of Minority Health and Health Equity: Working to Address Health Disparities

Guest Speaker: RDML Richardae Araojo, PharmD, MS

Associate Commissioner for Minority Health Director, Office of Minority Health and Health Equity U.S. Food and Drug Administration



RDML Richardae Araojo serves as the Associate Commissioner for Minority Health and Director of the Office of Minority Health and Health Equity (OMHHE) in the Office of the Commissioner of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In this role, RDML Araojo provides leadership, oversight, and direction on minority health and health disparity matters for the Agency. The Office of Minority Health and Health Equity aims to promote and protect the health of diverse populations through research and communication of regulatory science that addresses health disparities.

RDML Araojo previously served as the Director of the Office of Medical Policy Initiatives (OMPI) in FDA's Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER), where she managed the OMPI immediate office and three divisions. She led a variety of broad-based medical and clinical policy initiatives to improve the science and efficiency of clinical trials and to enhance professional and patient labeling. RDML Araojo worked collaboratively with other FDA disciplines, program areas, and FDA centers to foster an interdisciplinary approach to policy development and to enhance the integration of the continually evolving science and policy into FDA's drug development and regulatory review processes. In order to advance medical policy development, she provided oversight and direction for cross-cutting center and Agency working groups, as well as collaborations with external constituents.

In 2003, RDML Araojo joined FDA, where she held a number of positions in CDER's Office of New Drugs, first serving in the Division of Psychiatry Drug Products (formerly the Division of Neuropharmacological Drug Products) and then with the Pediatric and Maternal Health Staff (currently the Division of Pediatric and Maternal Health). Then, in 2010, she transitioned to the Office of Medical Policy, where she served as Acting Director of the Division of Medical Policy Programs, Deputy Director of OMPI, and finally Director of OMPI.

RDML Araojo received her Doctor of Pharmacy Degree from Virginia Commonwealth University, completed a Pharmacy Practice Residency with Emphasis in Community Ambulatory Care at the University of Maryland, and later earned a Master's degree in Pharmacy Regulation and Policy from the University of Florida.

The Role of the News Media in Today's Fast-Paced Environment

Senior Correspondent, Former Anchor and Managing Editor of PBS NewsHour



Broadcast journalist Judy Woodruff is the Senior Correspondent for the *PBS NewsHour*, after serving for 11 years as its Anchor and Managing Editor. During 2023 and 2024, she is undertaking a reporting project, "America at a Crossroads," to better understand the country's political divide. She has covered politics and other news for more than four decades at CNN, NBC, and PBS.

The recipient of numerous awards, including the Peabody Journalistic Integrity Award, the Poynter Medal, an Emmy for Lifetime Achievement, and the Radcliffe Medal, she and the late Gwen Ifill were together awarded Arizona State University's Walter Cronkite Award for Excellence in Journalism after Woodruff and Ifill were named co-anchors of the *PBS NewsHour* in 2013, marking the first time an American national news broadcast would be co-anchored by two women.

For 12 years, Woodruff served as anchor and senior correspondent for CNN, where her duties included anchoring the weekday program, *Inside Politics*. At PBS from 1983 to 1993, she was the chief Washington correspondent for *The MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour*. From 1984-1990, she also anchored PBS' award-winning weekly documentary series, *Frontline with Judy Woodruff*. In 2011, Woodruff was the principal reporter for the PBS documentary *Nancy Reagan: The Role of a Lifetime*. Then, in 2007, she completed an extensive project for PBS and other news outlets on the views of young Americans called *Generation Next: Speak Up. Be Heard*.

In 2006, Woodruff was a visiting professor at Duke University's Terry Sanford Institute of Public Policy. In 2005, she was a visiting fellow at Harvard University's Joan Shorenstein Center on the Press, Politics and Public Policy. From 2006-2013, she anchored a monthly program for Bloomberg Television, *Conversations with Judy Woodruff*.

Woodruff was White House correspondent for NBC News from 1977 to 1982. For one year after that, she served as chief Washington correspondent for NBC's *Today* show. She wrote *This is Judy Woodruff at the White House*, which was published in 1982 by Addison-Wesley.

Woodruff is a founding co-chair of the International Women's Media Foundation, an organization dedicated to promoting and encouraging women in communication industries worldwide. She serves on the boards of trustees of the Freedom Forum and The Duke Endowment. Formerly, she was a trustee of the Carnegie Corporation of New York and the Urban Institute and a member of The Knight Foundation Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics.

Woodruff is a graduate of Duke University, where she is a trustee emerita. She lives in Washington, DC with her husband, journalist Al Hunt, and they are the parents of three children.

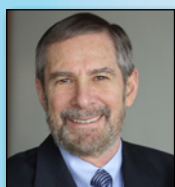

Dr. Lowy is the Principal Deputy Director of the National Cancer Institute (NCI), National Institutes of Health (NIH), and Chief of the Laboratory of Cellular Oncology in the Center for Cancer Research at NCI. He received his medical degree from New York University School of Medicine and trained in internal medicine at Stanford University and dermatology at Yale. Dr. Lowy's research includes the biology of papillomaviruses and the regulation of normal and neoplastic growth. The papillomavirus research is carried out in close collaboration with Dr. John Schiller; they have been involved in the initial development, characterization, and clinical testing of the preventive virus-like particle-based HPV vaccines that are now used in the three FDA-approved HPV vaccines. Dr. Lowy's growth regulation research is now focused primarily on the DLC family of tumor suppressor genes and their mechanism of action. In response to the COVID-19 epidemic, he has led the SARS-CoV-2 serology research effort at NCI. Dr. Lowy is a member of the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) and of the Institute of Medicine of the NAS. For their HPV vaccine research, he and Dr. Schiller have received numerous honors, including the 2007 Federal Employee of the year Service to America Medal from the Partnership for Public Service, the 2011 Albert B. Sabin Gold Medal Award, the 2012 National Medal of Technology & Innovation (awarded in 2014), and the 2017 Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award.

	Intralesional Therapies in Melanoma and Cutaneous Oncology <i>David Y. Chen, MD, PhD</i> Assistant Professor of Medicine, Division of Dermatology, Washington University School of Medicine, Saint Louis, Missouri



Dr. David Chen is an Assistant Professor of Medicine and Associate Chief for Research in the Division of Dermatology at Washington University School of Medicine. He received his MD and PhD degrees from Washington University Medical Scientist Training Program and completed his dermatology residency and postdoctoral fellowship in the Oliver Langenberg Physician Scientist Training Program at Washington University. He opened his laboratory in 2021, transitioning from studies involving the role of epigenetic regulators in leukemia with his postdoctoral mentor Dr. Timothy Ley, to study how epigenetic regulators create premalignant states in the skin. In his clinical practice, Dr. Chen cares for patients with advanced skin cancers, including metastatic melanoma and advanced non-melanoma skin cancers, where he is often confronted with clinical dilemmas that strongly influence his investigative pursuits. His research portfolio is focused on studying the molecular determinants of malignant progression of premalignant keratinocytes and melanocytes to their respective cancerous states. Currently, this involves identifying the role of epigenetic regulators in the development of cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma, examining the intersection between aging and skin cancer, and identifying defining molecular features of melanocyte transition states. His primary work is funded by the National Cancer Institute, Cancer Research Foundation, and the Barnes-Jewish Foundation, as well as generous support during his training from the Dermatology Foundation. He is part of collaborative efforts funded by the Melanoma Research Alliance.

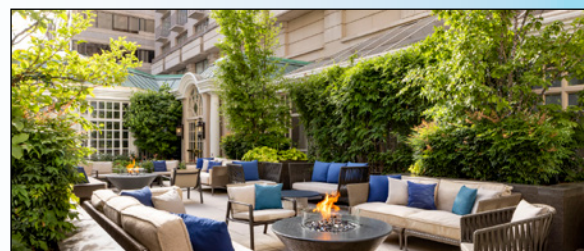
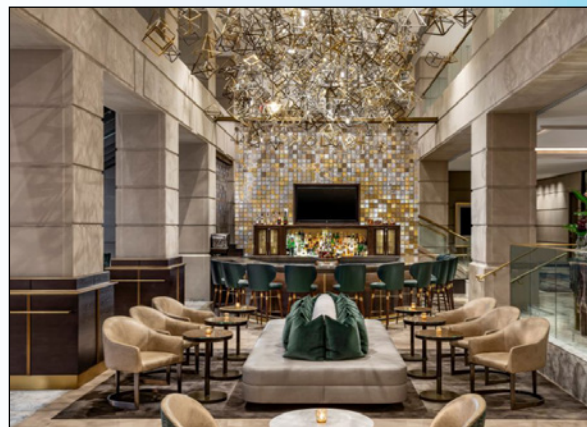
